READING IN K-2 CLASSROOMS

Our Literacy Journey

If your family has been a part of Grafton Public School for some time, you'll have noticed some changes in how we teach reading; if you're new to GPS, jump on board, it's going to be a fantastic journey! It's an exciting time to be in education as we align our instruction with effective reading strategies.

What does literacy instruction in the K-2 classroom include?

Our structured reading and writing approach includes

- Phonological awareness and phonics screening
- Explicit teaching of phonological awareness and phonics
- Automaticity training in the recognition of irregular words / high frequency words
- Guided practise to improve fluency
- Vocabulary development
- Explicit teaching of comprehension strategies

When We Know Better, We Do Better!

At Grafton Public School, we are dedicated to giving each child the skills they need to read proficiently. In order to succeed academically and socially and to enjoy all that reading brings to life, learning to read is a necessary skill. Every child should succeed in reading! We are learning more about how children learn to read in line with current research.

Years of study has shown that everyone's brain processes reading in a particular way. It doesn't come readily like speech does. The procedure of reading must be instructed. It is a process of creating connections between speech sounds and written symbols or letters in the brain.

By using teaching strategies in phonological awareness and explicit phonics instruction students are assisted to create a large network of quickly accessible words. Fluent reading and subsequent comprehension are the results of this.

SIX ESSENTIAL SKILLS THAT NEED TO BE TAUGHT FOR CHILDREN TO LEARN TO READ

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ORAL LANGUAGE

Oral Language is the system through which we use spoken words to express knowledge, ideas, and feelings. Oral language is often associated with vocabulary as the main component. Oral language consists of six areas: phonology, grammar, morphology, vocabulary, discourse and pragmatics.

PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

Phonological awareness refers to the specific ability to focus on and manipulate individual sounds (phonemes) in spoken words. Phonological awareness is auditory and does not involve words in print it includes: blending, segmenting, deleting and manipulating sounds.

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EXPLICIT, SYSTEMATIC AND CUMULATIVE PHONICS INSTRUCTION

Phonics is concerned with sound-letter relationships in written words and builds upon a foundation of language and phonological awareness. Phonics instruction helps children learn the relationship between letters of the written language and the sounds of the spoken language. Research suggests a synthetic phonics approach (blending and segmenting phonemes) is the most efficient way to teach phonics.

VOCABULARY

Vocabulary refers to words children can understand or use while speaking and listening. Oral vocabulary is closely related to reading which comprises the words children can recognise and use in their reading or writing.

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FLUENCY

Fluent readers are able to read orally with appropriate speed, accuracy, and proper expression. Fluency is the ability to read as well as we speak and to make sense of the text without having to stop and decode each word.

COMPREHENSION

The ultimate goal of all reading instruction is for students to understand what they read. Reading comprehension occurs only when students have both decoding / word recognition skills and language comprehension skills. Children need the essential skills to get the words off the page as well as knowledge, vocabulary, and a good understanding of how language works in order to comprehend what they read.

WHAT CAN I DO TO SUPPORT MY CHILD AT HOME?

ORAL LANGUAGE

Parents can develop oral language and comprehension with these activities:

- Active everyday conversations
- Sharing oral stories
- Reading books together
- Singing and playing rhyming games
- Listening games, such as 'Simon says'
- Dramatic play where your child takes on imaginary roles

PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

Try these sound activities at home:

<u>Syllable Shopping</u>

While at the grocery store, have your child tell you the syllables in different food names. Have them hold up a finger for each word part. Eggplant = egg - plant (2 syllables)

<u>Rhyme Time</u>

"I am thinking of an animal that rhymes with big. What's the animal?" Answer: pig. What else rhymes with big? (dig, fig, wig) <u>Silly Tongue Twisters</u>

Sing songs, read rhyming books and say silly tongue twisters. These help your child become sensitive to the sounds in words.

<u>Sound Games</u>

Practise blending sounds into words. Ask "Can you guess what this word is? m-o-p." Hold each sound longer than normal.

PHONICS

<u>I Spy the Sound</u>

'I Spy the Sound' is a fun way to build phonics skills and phonemic awareness. In this variation of the classic game, 'I Spy', ask your child to spy words that begin with a certain sound, rather than a letter. For example, " I spy with my little eye, something beginning with mmm."

<u>Play Dough Letters</u>

Using play dough, call out different letters of the alphabet and watch your child construct the letters. For a visual aid, place a flashcard of the letter they are trying to create in front of them.

Newspaper/Magazine Scavenger Hunt

Gather up any old newspapers and magazines you may have and ask your child to search for images that begin with the letter sound you have called out.

VOCABULARY

When introducing new words to your child, keep the following hints in mind:

- First, provide a simple, child-friendly definition for the new word: "Enormous means that something is really, really big."
- Second, provide a simple, child friendly example that makes sense within their daily life: "Remember that really big watermelon we got at the fruit shop? That was an enormous watermelon!"
- Finally, encourage your child to give their own example: "What enormous thing can you think of? Can you think of something really big that you saw today? That's right! The bulldozer near the park was enormous! Those tyres were huge."

FLUENCY

<u>Record It</u>

Another fun way to practise reading and build fluency is to have your child create their own audio books. This can be done simply with an audio recording feature or app on your phone. Your child might need a few 'takes' to get their reading just right. Sharing audio recordings with other family members, like Nan and Pop is often a great motivator. <u>Reader's Theatre</u>

You don't need a script or costumes or props. Just choose a favourite picture book that your child is familiar with, and one that has lots of dialogue. Take turns reading the passages aloud, using dramatic voices and gestures appropriate to the story. This activity can be lots of fun and is a way to practise expression in reading aloud.

It is important that a child does not randomly guess or use pictures to work out unknown words. Focus should be on the letters and the sounds, and the process of blending those together to read the word.

SOME KEY FEATURES WHEN SUPPORTING THE READING PROCESS

- Use a tracking finger to hold the position of reading and have your child slide it along as they read.
- If an error is made, ask your child to try decoding the word again. Then re-read the complete sentence to assist with fluency and understanding.
- If your child forgets the sounds when decoding, you may support them by prompting with the sound.
- At the end of the book or passage use the comprehension questions if they are available to check for understanding and to discuss the story.
- Celebrate your child's efforts when they read to you.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

- Phoneme The smallest unit of speech sound in a word. The word 'shark' has three phonemes (sh) (ar) (k).
- Grapheme The letter / s that spell the sounds in words. The word 'dog' has three graphemes: d, o, g.
- Phonology The study of sound structure in language
- Phonics A method of teaching people to read by matching sounds (phonemes) with symbols (graphemes).
 Phonics has the strongest evidence base there is for teaching reading and spelling.
- Morpheme The smallest unit of meaning in a word. The word 'sharks' has two morphemes shark + s. The base word is 'shark and the suffix 's' indicates plurality.





WHY SHOULD I READ WITH MY CHILD AT HOME



- Research shows that reading aloud to your child is the single most important thing you can do to prepare your child for reading and learning.
- Models what good reading sounds like.
- Nurtures a love of good quality literature.
- Strengthens bonds with your child.
- Develops oral language through discussion
- Builds background knowledge and understanding through factual texts.
- Expands your child's vocabulary.
- Decoding (sounding out)- Saying the phonemes (sounds) out loud to get an accurate pronunciation and recognition of an unknown word.
- Blending Saying the sounds quickly or stretching the sounds to hear the word.
- Segmenting Hearing a word and breaking it into its separate phonemes (sounds) to spell it.
- Automaticity The ability to read words quickly and accurately without having to stop and think about each letter or sound in the word.
